Meeting Minutes

The Propbusters meeting on April 9th started at 6:08 pm with 10 members present.



Newsletters were passed out for the Michigan Wolverines, the Skymasters, the Whirly Birds, The Holly Cloud Hoppers, the Wing Nuts, and the River District Eagles as well as the AMA Insider.

Gary W./Sheila made a motion to accept the secretary's report as read by Keith. Keith/John D. made a motion to accept the treasurer's report as ready by Ed O and pay bills. Both motions passed.

OLD BUSINESS

Tractor Update - Ed O provided an update on the tractor that Mark is working on. Compression test on the tractor came back acceptable. Mark suggested installing a temperature gauge to watch prevent the tractor from over-heating during the hot and humid days during the summer.

Fuel Orders - Gary W. reported that so far the Eagles have only received 2 orders and Dave's name was spelled wrong on the flyer they provided.

Work Day - Work Day on May 17th. We need wheel-barrels and a front loader to move dirt to fill holes, and some rakes to move rocks and gravel. We plan on cleaning up the parking lot and spreading some weed killer on the parking area. We discussed the difference between fertilizing and using weed killer on the grass.

We have some left over paint from last year to redo the tables and the flight stations. We will also be putting some screws into the shed (Gary S. has the screws). Gary Smedes will check at tractor supplies for pricing on a vent for the shed.

Weed whacking also needs to be done. We have paint for the frequency board if anyone is available. Gary has the flag and we have the paint to repaint the flag pole. Gary S. volunteered that he has a replacement Flag pole (25') that he is going to try to bring to the field.

Gary S. also brought up the need of shelves in the shed. We would like to work on emptying the bull pen if there is time left.

FUN FLY - Gary is working on the advertisement for the Times Herald's Blue Water Summer Days. Ed London has the sound system and it was mentioned to contact Jack DeLisle to be the announcer. We will wait on deciding the charity for our September Charity Fun Fly until later. Sheila will contact Gary at Pastime to see about the raffle price for the Fun fly. John Diver volunteered to handle the raffle.

We discussed getting someone to handle doing the concessions. Ed London volunteered to contact someone from SONS to see if they can/want to do it. If they do it we will add this to the flyer.

Gary Smedes will give a formal invitation to the members of Redline Racing to see if they would like to help. Gary will contact Bud to see if he is available for Candy Drop. Keith will send out flyers to channel 6 and others. Ed O. mentioned bringing in empty printer ink cartridges to the meeting and giving them to Sheila. They get them refilled in Port Huron and it will help lower newsletter production costs to the club.

Pilot Stations - A quote was provided by Gary Wilkerson. The cost to do 4 stations in PVC supplied at Carters Lumber would be \$206.28. The cost to do 4 stations in Pig Fencing would be \$113.39. Pricing could be lowered if anyone had some treated lumber they could donate. It was decided to wait until next month to see if any more proposals come in.

Ed O provided a status on the woods repair (with one of the clutches).

NEW BUSINESS

EAA at the St. Clair County Airport is September 28th. The Eagles received an invitation to do a static display (maybe flight also - electrics) during their event and they are extending the invitation to the Propbusters and other clubs. Anyone interested should contact Gary Wilkerson.

Sheila/Gary made a motion to end the meeting at 7:16 pm. Motion passed.

Safety First

I have worked around heavy metal cutting equipment my whole career. I am proud to say that I have not had even a minor injury that has required a stitch. That is not due to luck, but paying attention to my surroundings and equipment, and never for any reason putting myself or any part of my body in a compromising position. I learned there is nothing, and I mean nothing is worth the risk of an injury, not even for one second.

That's right; **SAFETY IS NO ACCIDENT.**

Avoiding bad practices and habits, a little planning can go along way in preventing accidents. A little common sense, following AMA and field rules is the place to start, they are intended to help keep you and others around you safe. Here are a few other suggestions to help keep flying safe.



Keep your fingers out of the prop. Use an electric starter, or a "chicken stick", when starting your engine, the finger you save will be your own. By a long shot, the thing most likely to cause injury is the propeller. Keep your fingers the heck out of there and attached to your

hand! Start safety, by starting safely.

Walk behind the plane to make engine adjustments. Nothing good will come about by reaching around the propeller. Sooner or later you will underestimate the diameter of the propeller- with disastrous results.

Here is one that always surprises me. Do not stand, sit or kneel in front of the plane while you rev the engine up. If it were to backfire, the propeller may let loose and you will be the prop-stop. Probably more importantly, if the tether line should break, the plane **is going** to move forward. If you are crouching in front of the plane - well you can do that math on what part of you will stop the prop.

Always tether or anchor your airplane when starting. It is a rule at most fields anyways. The days of starting with your right hand and only hanging on to the plane with your left hand are long gone, and it was never a good idea anyways.



Along the same thought, tethered or not, never start a plane in the direction of any person. Bring your plane up from the pits, near the flight line with no one in front of it before you start your engine. Nothing is more un-nerving than hearing a plane start behind you when you're flying. This is not only discourteous and dangerous, it's just stupid.

Do not stand in line with the swing of the propeller. Although not likely, the prop can break or have debris sucked in, if it does, it will throw along the propeller line. Be careful not to put yourself or anyone else into harms way.

Avoid walking on the field while there are planes in the air. If it is absolutely necessary, make sure you always ask permission of the other pilots in the air, and make sure they hear and answer you. Don't try to fix or start your plane while out there, do that back at the flight line. Announce when you are off the field as well. If you are flying, and someone announces they are going on the field, **never** fly over their head, fly as far as possible from the person. Never take off or land if someone is on the field, never enter the field if someone is taking off or landing.

Never fly over the other pilots, the pits, or spectators. Fly only in front of the flight line. Do not fly while field maintenance is being preformed. **There is never an excuse to fly over anyone's head.**

Try not to fly alone whenever possible. Call a friend, invite a neighbor, take a family member- anyone who can dial a phone.


This is a great chance to share your hobby with someone. If you must fly alone make sure you have a cell phone, with a phone number handy of a friend or relative that can be called at a moment's notice. Be sure you know how to tell someone how to get where you are in an emergency. You would be surprised how much more complicated remembering and explaining directions are when you're bleeding. Make sure a family member or friend knows where you are going and what time to expect your return.

Obviously, no one can predict when an accident will happen. Keep a first aid kit in your vehicle. Learn basic first aid. Have a plan, know the location of the closest emergency center or hospital, and know how to get there in an emergency, this is no time to be looking for a map. Have a list of emergency numbers in a convenient location, and have a plan on how to contact emergency workers. A little forethought can go a long way.



Happenings

I got to fly an airplane in a heavy wind today. This particular airplane is shown in the above photo. The little white thing in front of the landing gear and behind the prop is the motor and it's about 1/4 X 1 inch big and attached to a nice little gear "box". The little green thing you see behind the motor and in front of the wing is the receiver and motor controller and attached to that via two small magnets, and those are also the wire connections to the receiver / controller. Out of sight is the battery " pack "that powers the whole shebang. The battery is a Li-Poly and is about 1/4 X 3/4 X 3/4 inches big but more than 5 minute flights are the norm.



To give you some idea of the size of the transmitter / battery charger combination here it is being held in one normal hand. The charger is at

the lower left and the magnets are again the connections to the charger.

Would you believe that control is achieved with rudder and throttle? No elevator. Up and down is strictly a function of the throttle. Fast is up and slow is down.

Believe it or not, the plane is in the case that it came in. If you look hard you can see the wheels and go up and over to see the whole plane. Gene Lane got this outfit from his kids for his birthday.



The plane is a Plantraco and comes complete with the aluminum case, Transmitter , plane, receiver /controller and battery. It is available on the internet at <http://www.microflight.com> Did I miss anything??

So after Gene took off, yes a wheel take off. No hand launch here and showed me the ropes he landed and turned the transmitter over to me and soon I was doing circles and horizontal figure eights and even attempted a hand catch on one go but it bounced off of my hand. One of Gene's sons has tried a loop with the Plantraco but was unsuccessful and I didn't even try? Maybe after a few more times on the sticks? Like I said before there is no elevator so the loop has to be done using throttle management.

Did I tell you that the wind was blowing pretty good that day? It was. But not to worry cuz all of the flying was done in Gene's living room. Hit the walls a few times with no damage to the plane too.

Anybody could fly in the wind with this plane, HEH !!!!


