I've been reading about the new for airplanes spread spectrum radios and they are the best news in Radio Control since Monocoat® and CA glue and you might want to put ARF's in that category too.

4 Out Of 3 People Have Trouble With Fractions

But I am having a problem with the numbers and claims. Spektrum (the first out of the blocks with their rendition of Spread Spectrum) claims that you have to have two receivers to prevent the receiver from "hiding behind" a big engine and losing the signal and they must be positioned apart to work right. This is their 8 channel system. Their 6 channel system also has two receivers but they are in a package and look like one receiver???? They also claim that their six channel system is restricted to park flying only. Regardless of the two receivers in the six channel system?

Now Futaba® comes out with a spread spectrum system and it has one receiver, as far as I can tell, with the instruction that the two receiving wires should be kept as straight as possible and 90 degrees orientation with regards to one another (bend each antenna 45 degrees from each other as bending one 90 degrees may lead to breakage). Futaba says that their spread spectrum system is good to go for any airborne model and are not limited to "park" flying. I haven't checked the cost of the Spektrum systems but the Futaba sells for \$296.94 with four standard servos, batteries and etc or you can buy just the transmitter and

receiver for \$219.99 or the plug in transmitter module and receiver for \$189.99 from Tower Hobbies. Those prices are from their latest ads in the Model Airplane News magazine and the flyer I got today in the mail.

And to throw more gas on the fire I open up my latest issue of Model Aviation and there on page 14 is piece in the Worth a Closer Look section extolling the Xtremelink module system for transmitters having removable R/F modules that include Futaba, JR, HiTec, Multiplex and Airtronics radio systems.

The pictures of the transmitter module and the receiver show a short "nubbins" of an antenna protruding from the back / front of each. Not even a dipole with 90 degree separation? This system also has no rejoinder / warning to fly small planes in small places. Does the nub of an antenna sticking out of the back of a transmitter present a problem? Not if you fly without a trey. According to the piece this system will sell for \$179.

I started out this piece saying I had a problem and that isn't true because I probably will never buy another radio system because I have more then I need now but if I were to buy a radio now it would definitely be a spread spectrum. To my way of looking at it, all other radios are obsolete. Well maybe I will buy another radio because I can see a glut on the market of the radio systems setting on the dealers shelves.

Another thing before I close out this little dissertation. I know a few people flying their 40 and 60 size airplanes and using the Spektrum 6 channel radio. When they bought them I think they thought Park Flyer meant Yellowstone or Yosemite National Park?? The United States allows spread spectrum to broadcast at 1 watt. My JR XP1803 puts out 1/2 watt according to the manual!


