Decisions, options, and uncertainty slowed my progress. Soon other projects took precedence, and progress ground to a halt. Anyways, a friend put the maiden flight on her, she flew like a champ. Nervously, I took the sticks and flew her around awhile. It is always traumatic for me to see a new plane go up for the first time. It felt good to see it fly so well.

Triumphantly arriving home, I passed through the living room with my plane while my son was watching a sporting event. What inning is it? I asked. It is the third quarter, he replied, and It's football dad. Good, I remarked, it is probably better those guys charging each other do not have bats and balls, someone could get hurt.

I hung my new toy in the study, just over my computer where I could admire it. I pulled out the plans for my next project, and dream of light wind and clear skies. Life is good.


