This column must simply be started with: This years swap was the best we have had so far!

We had 35 reserved tables, we had 39 tables set up, Maynard LaParl got us the use of 13 extra tables, without which we would have been short. Even with a few "no shows", all the tables were full. In fact as some tables were vacated other vendors filled their places. Several extra vendors showed up at the door. That is a good thing, lots of vendors and lots of customers make for great deals for all. It is not often we have had all the tables full.

We advertised on the local radio station, The Times Herald, Placed flyers around town, Distributed flyers at the Northville swap and PMAC swap, there was an add in the local newspaper and the weekly planner, and even ran ads on Craig's list. The advertising to the general public seemed to help, there was a lot of new faces, and people interested in joining the hobby. The swap was packed.

The event was a lot of work, for a lot of people. The thanks start here: Sheila Olszewski for getting the flyers out there, working to get vendors, sending out mailers, picking up and pre-cooking the food, purchasing the supplies, taking reservations, making sure everything was in order with the park, making sure we had the proper equipment and supplies for the kitchen, and working with Pastime Hobbies to get the raffle prize. Then running around keeping everything in order, smoothing out any problems and just making sure everything ran well.

Continuing on with the thanks: Keith Graham. for getting the word out by e-mail, newspaper and radio. Gary Smedes and Doug Donnor. for manning the door. The Kitchen help: Maxine Davis, Sheila Henry, John Henry, Al Fournier, Doug Porret, John Diver, Maynard LaParl. Maynard also got us the extra tables we needed (big thanks). Doug Donnor did the 50/50 while I sold raffle tickets with the help and great smile of the lovely Paige Jones. Thanks also to Pastime Hobbies for getting us a great deal



on the Spektrum Transmitter and Receiver for the raffle prize. Last but not least: Everyone too numerous to mention who helped set up tables and put them away and cleaned the hall up. Ed London and Gary Wilkerson donated the use of their electric griddles.



For the record— because we will forget, we used: 10 dozen Eggs, 16 pounds of sausage (Bob Evans/pre-cooked by Sheila O), 14 lbs of pancake mix, at least 6 Pots of Coffee (large), 1 and 1/2 extra large bottles of syrup, 1 bottle of sugar free syrup, 1 gallon of orange juice, 1/2 case of water, and 20 cups of hot chocolate. Butter was in individual packages. We charged \$3.00 at the door. Coffee/ hot chocolate was \$1.00 if sold separately. \$5.00 per breakfast—drink included, and lowered it to \$3.00 near the end of the day as the line dwindled to nothing. We ran out of Orange juice and sugar free syrup. There was no eggs left, and only a little sausage left over. We took in: Raffle: \$277.00, 50/50: \$31.00, Door: \$409.00, Food: \$386.00

We spent: \$150.00 on the Hall, \$150.00 for the Raffle prize, 129.79 on Food and supplies.

All said and done we raised \$623.71 for the benefit of the SCC Propbusters R/C Club. It is one of the ways we are able to have such a nice field with nice equipment, and enough money to operate. The extra funds raised will help keep us a number one field, without having to raise our dues yet again this year. What can you think of that has not raise prices in over 10 years?

A few suggestions made by some of the vendors and workers that may help us out for the next swap were: Possible use of pre-paid meal tickets. Have separate entrance for vendors. Have distinct separate time for hall setup, vendor setup time and open to public times to allow the hall to be set up before the vendors, so vendors can set up before the general public start arriving.

Lastly, and more importantly. Everyone seemed to have a good time. We had several very positive comments from vendors and patrons complimenting the swap, food and people. Several vendors asked to be reminded next year, and everyone asked said they would come back next year.



“You Like Dat”

The “ULD” is a kit made by Budget R/C in Sanilac Michigan. The Brand is marketed on the internet as well as some hobby shops. Budget R/C specializes in foam type Electric powered airplane kits, that are easy and fast to assemble, and reasonable priced—Hence: Budget R/C

The ULD (You Like Dat) kit is marketed as a rubber foamie precision aerobatic trainer, for those ready to step up to acrobatic flying, with less fear of destroying a plane. It sounded like something worth a whirl.

Opening the bag, I found a combination of EPP and Depron components, along with several pieces of Carbon fiber rod and a piece of laser cut plywood.



In the world of foam, Depron is a type of very light rigid foam with excellent stiffness, but the price for the stiffness is that it does not handle the stress of a crash well. EPP on the other hand is a flexible type of foam often used for model airplanes for its resistance to breakage. However its stiffness leaves something to be desired. The ULD uses both married to carbon fiber for a nice compromise between stiffness and breakage.

For assembly and decorating I decided to go a little “green”. Not the color, but the whole earth friendly, lower emission, healthy thing. I decide to use canopy glue rather than CA, and a latex based paint Krylon has out called H2O. Ok, I do see the irony considering the spray propellant and foam, but I am trying to at least do something. Canopy glue holds to foam great, and is flexible—a good combination. The latex based paint holds onto the foam just fine. And neither wants to eat any type of foam used for planes. The other upside is nether stink the bejeebers out of the house. The down side is both take longer to dry.

Assembly is really straight forward and fast. First the flat carbon rod is installed in pockets in the wings and tail feathers. It seems pretty well placed away from the leading edge of the wings for protection. Once the rods are installed and glue dries, the formally rather limp wings become rather stiff.

After gluing some foam doublers to the fuselage sides the depron sides rails are added for stiffness. For added strength, depron angle strips are added. The engine mount is a simple affair consisting of three



laser cut pieces of light ply glued together and inserted into the fuselage. For the neutral thrust I balanced the plane on its nose and checked the body for square.

Painting is completed before final assembly. Choosing a decorating scheme was easy, keep it simple. After all this is to be a 3D trainer—not a hangar queen. The classic Arrow design is easy to see, and indicates direction and attitude of the craft well. Most of all, did I mention it is easy and simple?

Just before final assembly, the hinges are installed. For those of you not familiar with Blenderm tape, it is a medical type tape easily obtained at medical supply stores. With a very soft almost rubbery feel and an adhesive that just doesn't let go, it is an ideal hinge tape. I like to install a bottom layer first by putting the control surfaces together (as if they are folded in half and tape the underside first, then simply tape the top flat side and a perfect hinge is achieved. I find inch and a half wide tape to be ideal for foam models, the wider tape seems to give more area for adhesion. Perhaps a little extra weight, but well worth it.

Time to share a secret; Food cans make excellent fixtures for holding a member square and upright while the glue sets. Using cans as parallels to hold the tail feathers flat and square.

The final assembly of the airframe is pretty straight forward. The wings and tail are assembled to the fuselage and the canopies. Overall airframe construction time, maybe a couple of hours. I would rate this as an easy construction.

I still need to get and install the electronics and motor, and then take it for a spin. But that is next month's article (yes, there will be a next month's article).

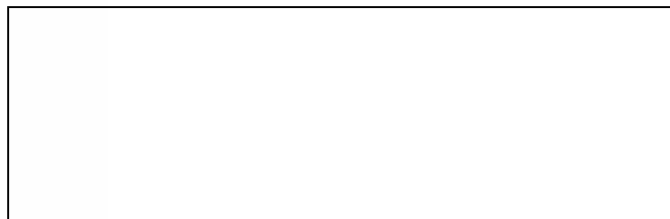
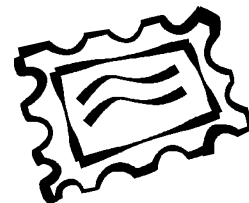
