July Meeting

Meeting started at 6:06 pm with 11 members present. Doug/Kirk made a motion to accept the secretary's report. That motion passed as did the motion made by Ron/Kirk to accept the treasurer's report.

Checks for reimbursement will only be made at the meeting after membership approval. We will make sure monies needing to be expended between meetings are voted on during the prior meeting.

Our new pilot parking lot was discussed. The new grass seed is coming up nicely.

Club Picnic: Redline racing will be out there with us with racing starting at noon. Doug volunteered to bring the grill. Doug made a motion to have give Kirk Churchill a check for \$50 for hotdogs/buns for the picnic. Eagles are donating 25 hotdogs, buns and relish and fixings they had left from their fun fly. Doug made a motion to invite the Eagles to our club picnic. Members are reminded to bring pop and a dish to pass.

Mark Steenland and Kirk talked about our wiring of the field for electricity. Wiring needs to be laid 24 to 36 inches deep. We are going to try to locate a Ditch Witch. We will be scheduling a work day.

July Meeting (continued...)

Kirk has estimated electrical needs as \$300 for wiring, \$50 for conduit, electrical box \$125 for both ends and some miscellaneous expenses. Doug/Ron made motion to spend up to \$600 for materials to lay the wiring.

The new flight line is in place until after the 4H Fair. We will keep the remaining part of the old runway trimmed, but not down as far as the runway. This will deter pilots from getting too close to Redline Racing and flying over the crater. Flight stations have also been relocated as they were at our Fun Fly. It was recommended not to have training going on during club events. We also recommend pilots thoroughly inspect their planes prior to flying.

Pete Cangemi and Eon from Cub Scout Troup 216 from Marysville were at the meeting. The cub scouts have an airplane and model making (no kit) Merit badges. The troop's planning usually occurs in September. They have over 30 troops he's acquainted with in the council. Kirk suggested setting up 3 plane designs. They could make servo boards and engines that could be quickly attached to the planes that the kids would build to keep cost down. We will try to arrange something with the cub scouts later on this year.

Frequency control. The change for the lock on the board was brought up. This combination is unique for that lock only. The frequency board should be open and in use when there are more than 3 pilots out there. Anyone out there with an AMA card should know the new combination. If you don't know, please contact a club member to find out the number. If you're flying at the field, you need a frequency pin.

Don't fly during the 4H fair if you don't feel sure of yourself. We want to keep everyone safe.

We will contact Carl's wife to see what kind of costing she would charge for doing T-Shirts. She does embroidery, but not hats. Last year we went through Doodling Monograms. We will get prices for the club.

Ed mentioned that pilots looking straight up to watch their planes are flying over the flight stations and this is a flight line violation, so don't do it.

Sheila mentioned that the toilet draining needs to have a week notice. They received grief for asking for it to be emptied two days before our fun fly.

Todd let everyone know that everything that's happened at the field has been decided by the board for the benefit of the club.

There won't be any work days currently scheduled before the club picnic. We are waiting on Kirk.

Sheila/Ron made a motion to end the meeting. The meeting ended at 7:17 then we watched the channel 6 video that Keith brought out.

Runaway Plane

After most of the crowd left the Eagles Gathering, Jack Drake of the Prophusters took off his son's Easy Sport 40 for it's second flight of the day. The first minute or so was uneventful, but as it entered a loop the plane no longer responded. Jack quickly became the all time "most loops" winner, if there was such a record, although still with no control. My son Josh's radio is one of those "dial a frequency" radios and we tried to gain control with that, with no luck, the problem was evidently with the aircraft. some minutes passed, and the loop degraded slowly to a circle, and the plane slowly circled the field barley gaining altitude.

To everyone's amazement, the plane settled into a circular pattern and remained in stable flight. The plane was flying itself. The light wind very slowly drifted the pattern to the north east. Jack took off in his car, and Sheila shortly followed, as chase vehicles. Meanwhile, at the field, we continued to helplessly watch the plane slowly circle out of sight. Everyone expected a small gust of wind to tip a wing, sending the plane to the ground. Stable as a rock, the plane continued to circle. We could see it for at least 20 minutes, I have to ask Jack what size tank he had on that thing. Sheila periodically reported in on the cell phone, letting us know she was still tracking the plane. I would guess at least a half an hour passed before the plane ran out of gas and slowly circled down, in a wooded area about a quarter mile from the road.

Remarkably the plane traveled about 3 miles from the field, traveling in circles, it would be interesting to know how many miles the plane would have gone if flying straight. To date, Jack still has not found the plane, so no one knows yet what the on board failure was.
