Electric????

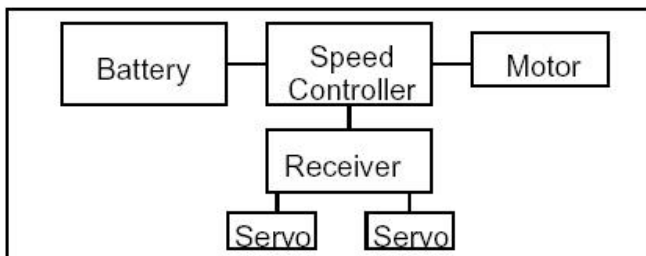

Over the last year several people have approached me interested in electric flight, but do not know where to start. I must admit I was the same way, and for sure, made several mistakes along the way, but have had the help of several knowledgeable people. Over the next several months I will try to cut through some of the choices and help with some starting points.

Like glow and gas engines, electric come in all sizes, and performance ratings. In general the smaller sizes have so far become the most affordable. What one might consider a power plant for a backyard flyer size has become probably the most reasonably priced. The basic "indoor" system with all the electronics, including motor and battery, at around a hundred and forty bucks. And sure, there are "upgrades" if you have the cash.



The receiver is a GWS 4 channel Pico receiver, with the FM 72mh crystal of your choice, and it comes Futaba, or JR compatible just like any other receiver. With a size of 3/8"X9/16"X1" and at only 1/6 ounce it is easy to forgive the 500 ft range. Remember this is for a light, small, backyard flyer, not a quarter scale, that you can see for a half mile. With the smaller size plane, it is not likely you will even need half that range. This is the basic "everyone uses" for almost all small applications, and it also comes in a 6 channel version if your needs require.



The basic electric flyer system requires a battery, speed controller, and a motor. One nice thing about the smaller electric power systems is that they come "plug and play", just plug the preinstalled jacks together - no fuss, no soldering, no mess.



A pretty standard power plant for a plane up to about 7 ounces (including electronics) is a GWS IPS (indoor power system) "A" drive. The gearbox, motor, and the electrical connector, even the spinner, all come as a ready to fly unit. The "A" actually refers to the gear reduction ratio from the motor to the prop, which is about 6 to 1. This allows the use of a much larger, higher pitched propeller than would be otherwise possible without a gearbox. The recommended propeller is a 10-4.7; the numbers are rated just like any other propeller - size and pitch. Why such an oddball pitch you ask, I don't know.



As its name implies, a GWS 50 (2amp) speed controller (also known as an ESC), plugs into the battery and channel 3 of the receiver to control current to the motor. The other function of the esc is to split off power from the main battery, powering the receiver. This feature is known as a battery elimination circuit, BEC for short. This eliminates the need for a second battery, and almost all speed controllers come with this feature. A 7.2-volt, 700 MAH lithium polymer battery will supply the power needs.



A Pico servo is about 1/10 the weight and size of a standard servo. Do not confuse Pico size with a slim or micro size; it is tiny by comparison to these also. On small aircraft, weight matters, a pair of servos can quickly add to the weight of an aircraft. Total weight of this combination, about 3 1/4 ounces, the combo produces about 4.7 ounces of thrust. This is plenty of thrust for smaller planes. This is what I use on the small white foam "EM2" and "Blue Butt" planes that I have. This motor combination is not geared for acrobatics, just laid back, backyard flying.

Next month we will talk about the slightly larger "300" size power systems, that you may have seen on a "Blue Foamy", such as a 3DX or Top Edge.
